More Prophets Part 4: S-T

Samuel spent the whole of his early life in the House of the LORD at Shiloh, one of the main centres of worship and where God dwelled among His people in the Holy of Holies. Samuel received his call from the LORD and the LORD was with him as he grew up. All the Israelites recognised Samuel as being attested as a Prophet of the LORD [1 Samuel 3: 20]

Shemaiah was active during the reign of King Rehoboam [1 Kings 12: 22]. King Solomon had appointed Jeroboam as superintendent of many of the king's building projects. There was a high level of dissatisfaction among the people, particularly in the ten northern tribes about Solomon's extravagance. Prompted by the prophet **Ahijah**, Jeroboam conspired to become king over the ten northern territories. His plans were discovered, and he fled to Egypt until King Solomon died. Solomon's son, Rehoboam succeeded his father, and Jeroboam returned in an attempt to reduce the burdens on the people. Rehoboam wouldn't listen and intended to increase their burden. Jeroboam was made King over the northern kingdom of Israel which left just the tribes of Judah and Benjamin loyal to Rehoboam. Shemaiah advised Rehoboam not to lead his army against the Northern Kingdom as the split had been the LORD's doing. [1 Kings 12: 24]

Once the Southern Kingdom had been established, they 'abandoned the law of the Lord' [2 Chronicles 12: 1] Because of this, Jerusalem was attacked by Shishak king of Egypt. The Lord told the king through Shemaiah that they were to be abandoned to Shishak [2 Chronicles 12: 6] The leaders humbled themselves before the LORD, the LORD relented and Shemaiah was told that the people would feel the difference between serving the LORD and serving other kings. Shemaiah's last mention is that he recorded the events of the reign of Rehoboam. [2 Chronicles 12: 15]

Simeon Niger was another of the gentile church leaders in Antioch who are described as teachers and prophets [Acts 13: 1]

The Two witnesses: In the book of Revelation, John describes being given the task to measure the Temple of God and the Altar, with its worshippers. [Revelation 11: 1-12]. Two unknown witnesses would be appointed by the Lord to wear sackcloth and to prophesy for 1,260 days. They would have power over anyone who wanted to harm them. At the end of their time they would be attacked and killed by the beast from the Abyss. Their bodies would lie in the public square of the city for three and a half days after which they would be raised to life and taken into Heaven on a cloud.

Universalism *The kingdom of Heaven is open to anyone...* [Matthew 22: 1-14]

In Biblical times, wedding customs were different from today. The parents of the betrothed would draw up the marriage contract with the couple then being considered as married. They would continue to live separately while the bridegroom went to prepare their future home. He would then return without notice for the wedding and wedding banquet to take place. The wedding feast or Seudat nissuin could last up to seven days and, for most, attendance would have been compulsory.

In this Parable, Jesus tells of a king who organised a wedding banquet for his son and invited many guests. When the time came for the banquet, his servants were sent out to tell them to come but they were ignored. A second group of servants was sent out and some even killed the servants. The enraged king sent his army to destroy the murderers and burn their city. The king next sent his servants out on the streets to bring in anyone they could find so that the room would be full of guests. One guest was ejected from the room because he was not wearing the required wedding clothes. As with many parables, Jesus starts by saying 'the kingdom of heaven is like...' In this case the original invitees are the Jews who believed that being God's chosen people was all that they had to be to enter Heaven. The servants who suffered rejection and even death represent the prophets who attempted to warn the Jews. At some banquets, the host provided special garments. The guest who was ejected had thought hat his own clothes were adequate and had not fully accepted the invitation to salvation.

This invitation is extended to all as we find foretold by Simeon on seeing the infant Jesus 'A light to lighten the Gentiles and the glory of thy people Israel.' [Luke 2: 32 Nunc Dimittis BCP]

A final Seudat nissuin is revealed to John in his Revelation vision: 'Then the angel said to me, "Write this: Blessed are those who are invited to the wedding supper of the Lamb!" [Revelation 19: 9] We must be mindful of the final words of the Parable of the Wedding Banquet

'Many are invited, but few are chosen.' [Matthew 22: 14]
