What's in a byname?

Those of us with email accounts will be familiar with the need to have a unique name for each account so that there is no confusion as to the intended recipient. How many of us have been forced to add random numbers to our name when creating such accounts?

In the days when there was little movement of population, a single given name would easily identify the individual within their community. With larger populations and more movement came the need to give more identity for individuals. Some bynames, often used as nicknames describe the occupation of the individual or of his family. For instance, in the legend of Robin Hood, we hear of Much the Miller's Son. In the same legend we find Little John where the byname is the opposite of his stature. Kings and Queens with the same regnal name adopt a sequential number to distinguish themselves. We will be familiar with the use of -son to denote a relationship but may not be aware of the mainly Icelandic -dóttir indicating the daughter of...

In our Bible, we find several bynames which are towns or villages. Simon of Cyrene was forced to carry the Cross and Joseph of Arimathea dealt with Christ's body after the Crucifixion. The first disciples include Simon the Zealot and James, son of Alpheus to identify them from the other Simon and James.

Perhaps the most unfortunate Biblical byname is that applied to the Apostle Thomas. He was among the first disciples and was chosen as one of the twelve. At that time his byname was Didymus or the Twin [St John 11: 16]. When Jesus received the news of the illness of Lazarus and was preparing to return to Bethany, it was Thomas who, when the other disciples were fearful of the threats to Jesus, urged them saying, "Let us also go, that we may die with him." [St John 11: 16].

At the Last Supper Jesus predicted his betrayal and Peter's subsequent denial. [St John 13: 18, 38]. He also told them that He was going away to prepare a place for them in Heaven and would come back to take them to that place and that they knew the way [St John 14: 2,3,4]. It was Thomas who expressed the disciples' confusion in asking "How can we know the way?". the response from Jesus was "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life [St John 14: 5,6].

On the Day of Resurrection, Thomas was not with the other disciples when Jesus appeared to them. During the following days, the disciples tried to convince Thomas that they had seen the Risen Lord. Despite this, Thomas was sceptical and said that he would only believe unless he saw Jesus for himself. [St John 20: 25]

A week later, Thomas and the disciples were again meeting in a locked room when Jesus appeared with them. St John 20: 26]. Thomas was given the opportunity to overcome his doubts and did so. His confession "My Lord and my God" makes him potentially the first person to explicitly acknowledge the divinity of Jesus. Because of this it is perhaps unfortunate that his byname "Doubting Thomas" is the one by which he is remembered.

The Bible gives us no further information about Thomas but traditionally, he is thought to have taken the Gospel to present day India where Santhome Basilica in Chennai [formerly Madras] houses his shrine.

The First Passover:

Jacob, who had been renamed Israel by the LORD, and his sons and their families had settled in Egypt. Their numbers had increase over many years until the reign of a new Pharoah, "to whom Joseph meant nothing", [Exodus 1: 8]. He saw the Israelites as a threat to his kingdom [Exodus 1: 9,10] and attempted to make their lives a misery.

Moses was commission by the LORD to go to Pharoah to demand the release of His people. Moses did so but Pharoah did not listen. The LORD inflicted a series of nine plagues on Egypt. Even turning the river to blood, frogs, gnats, flies, killing Egyptian livestock, hail, locusts and darkness had no effect. The tenth and final plague was to kill every first born in Egypt, but the Israelites would be safe if they sacrificed a lamb and daubed its blood on the doorframes of their houses. Pharoah finally changed his mind and allowed the Israelites to leave. Pharoah changed his mind, and his army followed the Israelites to the coast of the Red Sea. The Lord commanded Moses to stretch out his hand over the sea. The sea parted and the Israelites were able to cross as if on dry ground. [Exodus 14: 21]. The Egyptian army attempted to follow but as Moses lowered his arm, they were engulfed by the sea.

The blood of the sacrificed lamb was a mark which saved the Israelites and prompted their escape from oppression in Egypt.

In the blood of Christ we have a new birth and a living hope through the Resurrection and our inheritance can never perish, spoil or fade.
