The Parable of the Weeds

'wheat and tares together sown, are to joy or sorrow grown' [Come ye thankful people, come...] Henry Alford (1810–1871).

The purpose of a parable is to tell a story which has a hidden meaning and was a method widely used by Jesus in his teaching to the crowds and then to his disciples,

The psalmist wrote 'My people, hear my teaching; listen to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth with a parable; I will utter hidden things, things from of old' [Psalm 78: 1,2]

This week's Gospel reading brings us to the Parable of the Weeds. [Matthew 13: 24-30, 36-43]. In the parable, a man planted good seed in his land, but an enemy came and scattered weed seeds across the land. In the Authorised Version of the Bible, the weeds are described as tares. It is difficult to distinguish between tares and wheat as they are growing and any attempt to clear the tares in the early stages of growth would result in the loss of some of the wheat crop. The man's servants saw that the weeds were present but were told to leave them until harvest. Then they could collect and burn the weeds before harvesting the main crop. Separating the two types of seed was important as the flowers and seeds of the tares are poisonous.

As with other parables the explanation was only given to the disciples when the crowds had dispersed. The enemy is named as the Devil and the field owner is the Son of Man, a title that Jesus used when referring to Himself and used in the vision of Daniel [Daniel 7: 13]. The good seed represents the people of God's Kingdom. The weed seeds and their plants represent everything that causes sin and all who do evil and who will be thrown into the fiery furnace. At harvest time, the products of the good seeds would be gathered into the barns as the righteous will be gathered into the eternal presence of God. A further parable shares the theme of judgment. In the Parable of the Net [13: 47-50] the fishing net is deployed and catches a large number of fish. When brought to shore, the fishermen sort the fish and put the good fish into baskets but throw the bad fish away in a representation of the Judgement to come.

The Prophet Jonah: Chapter 1: Go to Nineveh!

Nineveh was the capital of the Assyrian Republic and around 700 BC was one of the largest cities in the world with a population of over 100,000. It was built on the eastern bank of the River Tigris in what is now northern Iraq.

In 701 BC The Assyrians had invaded and conquered the northern Kingdom of Israel and taken the people into exile [2 Kings 18: 10,11]. Seven years later the Assyrian king Sennacherib, had laid siege to Jerusalem and the southern Kingdom of Judah. [2 Kings 18: 17,48]. It was with this background that we meet Jonah. Jonah is

It was with this background that we meet Jonah. Jonah is commanded by the LORD to go to Nineveh to preach against its wickedness [Jonah 1: 1]. Jonah was reluctant and set off in the opposite direction the port of Joppa on the Mediterranean coast to take a ship to Tarshish. What followed is perhaps the best-known part of Jonah's prophecy. Jonah is asleep on the boat when a violent storm blew up which threatened the ship. The crew cast lots to find out who was responsible, and Jonah was selected. Jonah admitted that he was a Hebrew and was running away from the LORD. Jonah realised that this the reason for the storm and told the sailors to throw him overboard. They eventually did so, and the storm ceased. They offered a sacrifice to the LORD and made vows to Him.

Jonah was provided for by being swallowed by a huge fish inside which he remained for three days.

Psalm 65: 1, 2, 8

- 11 Teach me your way, Lord, that I may rely on your faithfulness; give me an undivided heart, that I may fear your name.
- 12 I will praise you, Lord my God, with all my heart; I will glorify your name forever.
- For great is your love toward me; you have delivered me from the depths, from the realm of the dead.
