The Pharisees and Sadducees

The Epistle reading for All Saints Day in the Book of Common Prayer, reminds of the twelve tribes of Israel [Revelation 7: 3-8]. Twelve thousand from each tribe were sealed "on the forehead of the servants of our God".

The Twelve Tribes of Israel were the descendants of the sons of Jacob who had been welcomed to and settled in Egypt. Joseph, one of the twelve, had earlier been sold into slavery in Egypt by his brothers. [Genesis 37: 28] Whilst in Egypt, Joseph had been given the power to interpret Pharoah's dreams predicting a period of plenty followed by seven years of famine. Joseph was given charge of making sure that the surplus grain was stored in preparation for the famine.

The famine came and eventually Jacob and his sons were given permission by Pharoah to settle in Egypt [Genesis 42: to 47:]. Years passed and the tribes prospered and grew, but a new Pharoah thought that they had grown too powerful and decided to oppress them. This eventually led to the various plagues inflicted by the LORD on Egypt and the Israelites' eventual escape on their way back to the Promised Land.

The tribe of Levi was set apart by the LORD to carry the Ark of the Covenant, to minister before their LORD and to pronounce blessings in His name. [Deuteronomy 10: 8] and eventually to minister as Priests in the Temple.

A series of Judges were raised by the LORD to be the administrators, rulers on judicial matters and military commanders of the Israelites as they fought against the local tribes to establish their territory. Some names will be unfamiliar to us, but we should have heard about Joshua, Gideon, Samson and Samuel. Then followed a series of Kings starting with Saul and David. Some of them attempted to follow the LORD but others failed and ultimately the tribes were taken into exile. After around 70 years, they were allowed to return and the Temple in Jerusalem was rebuilt. Two additional groups of religious leaders emerged, but their first references come in the four Gospels and in the Acts of the Apostles. These were the Pharisees and Sadducees, two groups who didn't always agree but became united in their opposition to Jesus.

The Pharisees are described as Teachers of the Law and were meticulous in the extreme in their interpretation of the Hebrew Bible and the many oral traditions. As a group they believed in the spiritual realm of angels and demons, in the Resurrection of the dead, that the Messiah would set up His kingdom on earth, and that there was an afterlife. They were accused by Jesus of being hypocritical in the observances [Matthew 23: 1-38]. There were some Pharisees who did chose to follow Jesus including Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea as well as St Paul.

The Sadducees were mainly drawn from the higher classes in Jewish society and were the administrators and members of the Sanhedrin, (the Jewish courts), acted as judges in local disputes and were responsible for the maintenance of the Temple. They restricted themselves to only the written Hebrew Bible as the source of divine authority and didn't believe in the afterlife nor the Resurrection.

In the set Gospel reading for today, [St Luke 20: 27-39], we read about an encounter that Jesus had with a group of the Sadducees. Despite not believing in the Resurrection, they asked a very unlikely question of Jesus. The response from Jesus to their question gave a hint of what was to happen in the Age to Come for Children of the Resurrection.
