Mission Area Structure Review

Our Parish of Darfield is part of the Wath2 Mission Area with the parishes of Ardsley, Thurnscoe, Bilham, Barnburgh and Adwick on Dearne. A total of eleven churches share the ministry of three full-time Oversight Ministers, Rev. Fiona Kouble, Rev. Sarah Maughan and Rev, Jo Twigg. The Oversight Ministers are licenced as Associate Ministers within each Parish but have their own groupings of parishes which are their direct responsibility.

The ancient boundaries between the Parishes, particularly in the western part of the Mission Area place the area of Great Houghton, Little Houghton, Middlecliffe and Billingley within the Parish of Darfield with overall responsibility for St Michael's vested in Darfield Parochial Church Council. For many years St Michael's has had its own District Church Council with certain delegated powers from the PCC.

A review of the boundaries between the Parishes of Thurnscoe and Darfield has recently been suggested which could potentially change them to place Houghton with Thurnscoe. No decision has yet been made and a series of consultations within the affected parishes are in the process of being organised. All contributions to this review are welcome to allow the PCC's to know exactly how the Congregations and wider communities feel. These can be passed on to Peter.

Before any changes can be made, a Pastoral Scheme must be drawn up and agreed by the PCCs. The legal process then takes the Proposal to the Deanery and Diocesan Pastoral Committees for consideration before the Church Commissioners make the final decision.

What's in a Book? Isaiah

The prophesies made by Isaiah were written in the middle of the 8th Century BC during the reigns of Kings Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz and Hezekiah of Judah [Isaiah 1: 1] It was during this period that Shalmaneser V, ruler of the Assyrian Empire attacked and over-ran the Northern Kingdom of Israel and took many of the people into exile. Shalmaneser also attempted to subdue the Southern Kingdom of Judah but was prevented by the LORD and the actions of King Hezekiah.

Isaiah's message concentrated on the LORD as both Judge and Saviour. He prophesied the future overthrow of the Kingdom of Judah which led to the exile in Babylon and the later return to Jerusalem.

His call included a dramatic vision of the Lord enthroned in majesty and Isaiah's response 'Here am I, Send Me' [Isaiah 6:]

Throughout the book there are references to the promised Messiah including 'A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit.' [Isaiah 11.1].

Those promises continue to be available to us.

Christ the King

The Book of Common Prayer marks this Sunday as the final Sunday after Trinity otherwise known as the Sunday next before Advent. The opening words of the Collect 'Stir up we beseech Thee O Lord the wills of thy faithful people' have been adopted into one of our pre-Christmas traditions which dates back to the Victorian era. Families would gather around the kitchen table to join in the preparations for making the Christmas puddings, often to a favourite family recipe. Everyone there would take their turn to stir the contents of the bowl. Other traditions would perform the stirring from east to west to commemorate the visit of the Wise Men to Jesus. The following weeks would allow the puddings to reach maturity in time for the celebrations. Often a small coin would be included in the pudding mixture to bring the finder good health and wealth for year ahead, or a new year's visit to a dentist for the unwary,

In 1925, Pope Pius XI instituted the last Sunday in October as the **Feast of Christ the King** to remind Christians that their allegiance was to their spiritual ruler in Heaven as opposed to earthly supremacy. In 1969 it was moved to its present position as the last Sunday of Ordinary Time before Advent Sunday, the traditional start of the Church's year.

In our Bible we can find many references to Christ as King.

- The Wise Men came to Jerusalem seeking the 'King of the Jews' [Matthew 2: 2] and were directed by Herod to Bethlehem.
- In describing the events of the first Palm Sunday, Matthew links the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem on a donkey as fulfilling the words of the Prophet Zechariah... "Say to Daughter Zion, 'See, your king comes to you, gentle and riding on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey." [Mathew 21:5, Zechariah 9: 9]
- When Nathaniel first came to Jesus, he described Jesus as the Son of God and the King of Israel. [John 1: 49]
- Pilate asked Jesus if He was 'King of the Jews' [John 18: 36] and prepared a notice for the Cross inscribed 'Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews' [John 19: 19].
- The Book of Revelation describes Jesus as 'King of Kings and Lord of Lords' [Revelation 17: 14 & 19: 16]. Charles Jennens incorporated this phrase into the Hallelujah Chorus in the oratorio Messiah set to music by George Frideric Handel.

This current Liturgical Year started as ever with the season of Advent where we look forward both to the celebration of our Lord's birth and the promise of the Messiah to come, and ends this week with the proclamation of His universal sovereignty.
